PREFACE

One of the most important aspects of the life in Christ is prayer. Indeed, the Lord Jesus Christ himself spoke much concerning prayer, as we particularly read in Matthew 6. The 'Lord's Prayer' is our model for how we ought to address our heavenly Father in our spiritual and holy converse with him.

The apostolic injunction exhorts us to "Pray without ceasing" (I Thessalonians 5:17). In our world today, in which we are constantly occupied with the many burdens and distractions of our daily routine in life, we find that very hard to accomplish. Many faithful desire to put into practice this exhortation of St. Paul, but are simply unable to because they simply do not know how to do so.

The Church's divine mission, as the ark of salvation, is to encourage and teach her children to pray, and to pray often. Faithful to her mandate given through the holy apostles to "Go forth and make disciples of all nations..." she teaches her children the importance of a life of prayer. Without prayer, we cannot fulfill our baptismal vocation as members of the Body of Christ and as temples of the Holy Spirit. In a word, we cannot grow in the divine life given to us graciously be Christ, if we do not nurture and sustain prayer as a daily and essential part of our life of faith.

The present volume is a collection of prayers from the Church's liturgy of the hours abbreviated for the use of beginners in the life of prayer. Often, the complexity of the liturgical structure of the hours of prayer eludes the simple believers, who nonetheless would like to participate and share in the Church's prayer life, and to

make it their own. Therefore, it was found expedient to have available for the faithful a simple prayer book, the present volume, which intends to address the spiritual needs of those faithful who are beginners in the life of prayer. Its intent is not so much for liturgical use, but for the private use of the pious faithful.

This prayer book for beginners was intended to help certain of the faithful to begin to pray. The prayer book was then expanded to include prayers for various occasions and selections from the writing of the Fathers of the Assyrian Church of the East concerning prayer.

It is my fervent prayer that this prayer book will be most useful for the faithful of the Church, and in particular the youth. May it be an often-used instrument at both home and the workplace, as it is compact enough that one can take it with wherever one goes, be it to work, to school or while travelling It is my hope that much use will be made of the prayer book by both young and old, particularly those who mostly make use of English.

May the grace and blessings of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit bless all those who make use of this prayer book. May you grow in the love and practice of prayer, the 'key' which opens the doors of heaven to the penitent and to the pious alike.

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AN INTRODUCTION TO PRAYER

What is Prayer? Prayer is many things:

- It is the offspring of faith.
- It is the acknowledgment of the presence of God in our life.
- It is an opportunity. An opportunity to speak with our Creator and Lord.
- It is a responsibility. A responsibility of man.
- It is an offering. An offering we offer to God.
- It is one of the greatest ways by which we may draw near unto God.
- It is the distinct activity in which the people of God enjoy partaking in.

How should one pray? A man should pray...

• With faith. We must believe that God hears our prayers and is pleased when we turn to him. We

must believe that He knows all things, even the things we need before we ask Him, but that it pleases Him for us to humble ourselves and come to Him for everything. By doing so, we acknowledge Him as our source and giver of every good thing. As our Lord Jesus Christ taught us, "Ask and you shall receive..."

- Often. We must not think that we know better than the timing or wisdom of God. We must always pray, even if we don't receive an immediate answer. Why? One reason is because things that are gained through hardship last a lot longer than things gained easily. Another reason is because it is our responsibility, as a creation of God, to praise Him continuously, simply because He is God. By doing so, we fulfill our role as human beings and are able to better partake in the life which God wants for us to have... that is, a life with Him as the object of our love and continual adoration.
- With a pure heart. We must approach God without any bitterness in our hearts to others. We pray in the way that our Lord taught us: "Forgive us, just as we have forgiven others..." (Matthew 6:12). Thus, if we want our prayer to be accepted we must not be

- lying. We must also not pray simply to make others happy and for vainglory, but rather, our only concern should be to please God when we pray. We must have pure intentions.
- At a time and place of quiet. Times of peace and quiet, when we are able to collect our thoughts, are best to pray. Although, we should and can pray anywhere and anytime in our hearts... while we drive or ride our bikes we can be saying little prayers in our heart.
- *In humility.* We must approach God with humility. Humility is not thinking highly of ourselves. Humility is seen in a man who sees his own weakness and frailty as a created being and is in continual awe of the greatness of God his creator. Thus, he relies on God for everything. His wisdom, righteousness, happiness, and everything come from God.

What types of prayer are there? There are:

- 1. Prayers of thanksgiving when we give thanks to God;
- Prayers when we seek help from God;

- 3. Prayers when we seek forgiveness for our sins;
- 4. Prayers of praise when we praise the greatness of God.

How are prayers said?

- Before beginning, make the sign of the Cross over your body and say: In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen. The sign of the Cross can also be made at any time throughout the prayer, whenever you wish to do so.
 - o We make the sign of the Cross because it is the sign of the Son of God, Jesus Christ. It is almost as if we are saying from the beginning, "I am a member of the Lord Jesus Christ, and as a member of Him, I am now going to pray, O Lord hear my prayer!" It also helps us to always be aware of the fact that we belong to Christ who died for the sin of the world through crucifixion, was resurrected, and now lives to God; we too, who have been baptized, have died to the things of

this world and live a life for Him; his Cross being a constant reminder as to what we have died to and to whom we are living. Also, it should be known that Satan and all the evil hosts tremble and flee from before the sign of the cross.

- We pray in the name of the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit because it is through this name that we have received and do receive every good thing:
 - The Father, the source of all that is good and pleasant, in His love, sent unto us His Son.
 - The Son, the image of the Father, in his mercy came to save us and not judge us. He hears us and makes intercession for us with the Father.
 - The Holy Spirit of God, whom the Father sends to make holy all those who draw near unto the Son.
- We always pray facing East.
 - We pray facing east, not because God dwells in any specific direction or in any special place more than another, but because facing that direction is both representative of the direction which the

Apostles saw Christ ascending into heaven and also because it helps us remember that we are praying in eager anticipation of the return of our Lord Jesus Christ from heaven, who said, "As lightning coming out of the East is seen as far as the West, so shall the coming of the Son of Man be" (Mt 24:7).

- The entire prayer rule should be said when we first begin. But it should also be known that we should not simply say prayers so that we can finish our prayer rule. But, rather, prayer should be a joyful occasion.
 - What if we struggle with prayer i.e. we are not so happy to say it and actually want to avoid it?
 - This is something that even Saints experience. But we must not give in to this temptation! The beginning of someone's downward fall is when he begins to fall away from prayer.
 - If we struggle to pray, one good thing that helps much is by going to the church, and partaking in the prayers as a community. That way you are not by yourself, but rather, with many people. And when God sees people come together, in peace, with the intention of offering prayer to

- Him, he bestows His blessings upon that activity and the ones who partake in it.
- Joy in prayer is a gift of the Holy Spirit, just as sorrow over sin is as well. And these gifts come to those who work hard to earn them; not as if we deserve them, but that through our hard work we will better appreciate them and be able to remain in them. Because the only thing worse than not receiving these gifts, is receiving them and then losing them because we were irreverent of them.
- What if we don't want to say the entire prayer rule?
 - Say what you can, but do not make a habit of it. Remember, it is better to say 5 words willingly than 5,000 unwillingly. We should ask ourselves, however, "Why am I not willing to spend more time in prayer with God?"

Why do we say a Creed of Faith at the end of our prayers?

o It helps us to believe in and proclaim a right confession of God. A right confession is necessary in order to give a right glory unto God. o For Example: A belief which does not confess one God, does not glorify God; neither does one that is not built on the Lord Jesus Christ; neither does one that does not believe in the message of His gospel, that being the resurrection and eternal life. All of these things, and others as they are found in The Creed, are necessary for one to observe to give a right glory unto God.

What are the specific times of prayer the Church teaches us to pray?

- There are a total of seven times of prayer, four of which are canonical for every person in the church to pray every day. These four times of prayer are the: 1) Evening, 2) Before Sleep, 3) Night, and 4) Morning Prayers. However, as things are today, two of these are more observed than the others. These two are: The Morning and Evening Prayers. It is these two prayers that we provide in this booklet in an abbreviated form, for your use in prayer.
- The Morning Prayer (usually near sunrise): We pray this before the work day begins and ask God to help us in all that we do, and that He may deliver us from evil and occasions of sin. We also sing praises

unto God at the morning hour especially, because it was at this time (when light shone for the first time) that the angels began to sing praise unto God. Thus, we also join in with the angels of heaven and give glory to God, the Creator of all things!

• The Evening Prayer (usually just before sunset): At this time, when the day is coming to an end, we give thanks to God for the preservation of our life throughout the day. We also ask for a night of tranquility and peace; we ask also for the forgiveness of any faults or offenses which we may have committed during the day, whether we know of them or not.

A brief demonstration and exhortation to you, O beloved reader, that you should with your whole heart draw near to the holy work and God-pleasing activity of prayer. Also, some scriptural demonstrations concerning Prayer:

In the short and varied sections above, we spoke briefly about what prayer is, how to pray, and how prayer is observed in the Church. But we wish to also make you aware, O beloved son/daughter of the Church that this activity, which God has given to man, should not be something we take lightly or belittle in any way. Rather, we should be assured that through this activity we may come to find the way of holiness and be

enabled to progress along that very path which leads to God. This has been made known to us through the witness of the Church. The greatest of all witnesses of this truth is the Head of the Church, the Lord Jesus Christ, who taught us both by his own example and by his word, to always be in prayer. This exhortation of the Lord will be seen in the below examples to have existed beforehand in all of the righteous faithful. Thus, we find that this is the activity that the People of God have partaken in since the beginning of creation. This means that the holy activity of prayer is a work which is done by those people who believe in, who know, who are in covenant with, who wish to see, who wish to be with, and who love...God. Thus, by beginning to develop a life of prayer, you embark on the same path as all those holy men and women who in times past existed and whose testimony remains till this day that they were pleasing to the Lord. This is helpful for us to know because our Lord taught us that "the road is narrow, and few are those who are found on it;" thus, it is reassuring to know that we are at least in one way trying to participate in the same things that all the Saints throughout history have participated in. Of course, prayer that is offered with a pure heart is what is we strive for and not simply just the outward form of prayer (as mentioned above, in the section How Should One Pray). But if we do not begin seeking out the narrow path, we will never find it; if we do not at least begin travelling down the path, then we will never get to our

destination. Thus, while placing our hope and trust in the Lord, we should begin to live a life of prayer. And through your diligence and above all, God's grace, you may be brought to offer God pure prayer.

Below is a brief demonstration that from the beginning of the world and even until now, those who wished to be with God and to worship Him, have partaken in prayer:

In the first generations when man was created, they began to "call upon the name of the Lord" (Genesis 5:26) (c. 5500 BC).

Noah prayed to the Lord and the whole earth was blessed (Genesis 9:20) (c. 3260 BC)

Abraham prayed and Abimelech and his entire household were healed (Genesis 20:17) (c. 2100 BC).

Isaac prayed to the Lord and the barren womb of his wife Rebecca bore him twins (Genesis 25:21).

Through the prayers of Moses, 10 plagues were brought upon Egypt, a sea was split, kings were overthrown, bread came from the sky, water gushed forth from a rock, forgiveness was given to idol-worshippers, but even greater than all of these...God spoke back to him. (Exodus) (c. 1500 BC)

Joshua, the son of Nun, overthrew the walls of Jericho and caused the sun to stand still through his prayer (Joshua 6, 10:12).

Hannah's barren womb bore Samuel the prophet through her prayer (1 Samuel 1:27).

Was there anything that King David did not do through prayer? (c. 1000 BC)

Jonah was brought up from the belly of a whale because of prayer (Jonah 2:1) (c. 800 BC)

185,000 soldiers were killed in one night in response to Hezekiah's prayer, and the entire kingdom consequently saved (2 Kings 19) (c. 700 BC)

Hezekiah was delivered from his deathbed and received 15 extra years of life through his prayer (2 Kings 20).

Habakkuk found contentment in resigning himself to God's will and even rejoiced in God, despite the injustice he saw being committed by his own people and the foreknowledge of the troubles they were to experience later.

Through prayer the three young men Ananias, Azaria, and Mishael were delivered from a fiery furnace. (ca. 500 BC)

Through prayer lions' mouths were shut and Daniel was kept unharmed (Daniel 6)

Through prayer Daniel was made worthy to know the future and end things, which God had planned to accomplish.

Zechariah, John the Baptist's father, received the revelation from Gabriel during his prayer (Luke 1:13)

The Lord Jesus Christ spent time during the day in ministry and his time during the night in prayer.

The Apostles were in continual prayer (Acts 2:42)

St. Stephen the first Deacon and Protomartyr prayed and saw Christ before he died.

Wherever the feet of the Apostle St. Paul walked, there his prayer gave him victory.

Through the prayers of Mar Addai, King Abgar was healed and converted (c. 37 AD).

- St. Ignatius of Antioch received his crown of martyrdom through prayer (c. 110 AD).
- St. Polycarp prayed fervently and received his crown of martyrdom as well (c. 120 AD).

Mar Ephrem the Deacon composed innumerable prayers and praises for us to recite during prayer (c. 307-363 AD).

Mar Aphrahat has written an entire demonstration on *Pure Prayer* (mid-4th Century AD).

Catholicos-Patriarch Mar Shimon Bar Sabbai would only pray to the true God and not bend his knee to a foreign god, and for that was martyred (c. 341 AD).

St. John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople, led his entire congregation in prayer. (407 AD)

St. Theodore, Bishop of Mopsuestia, wrote a commentary on *The Lord's Prayer* (c. 428 AD).

Catholicos-Patriarch Mar Aba I was made great and wise through prayer (c. 540 AD).

St. Isaac of Nineveh's entire life was dedicated to prayer (c. $613-700\ \mathrm{AD}$).

Barbarians were converted to Christianity through the miracles attributed to the prayers of Mar John Dailomaya (738 AD) Fragments of the Psalter and other prayer books were found in China from the missionary activity of the monks there (7th/8th Century AD).

Mar Thomas of Marga (c. 850 AD) recounts how the monks of Beth Abhe persevered in prayer.

Through the prayers of Mar Yosip Khnanisho (1893-1977 AD) people received healing of all sorts and a resolute faith.

How many innumerable men and women, whose names we do not even know, but whom God knows very well, have prayed and have been accepted by Him!

From the beginning of the world it has been shown to us that those who worship God (and more importantly, those who have been approved by God i.e. his Saints) partake in prayer. This is abundantly clear from the witness of the Saints, from the days of Adam till today. Prayer is the distinct activity of the People of God. On the other hand, however, how does the scripture characterize those who are ungodly and do not care for God? It says that "...they called not upon the Lord" (Psalm 14:4).

Thus, let us be assured of this most holy activity and give it priority in our life. For it is one of the main activities that make up the life of a Christian from the day he is

baptized up until the day he meets Christ the Lord. Other important spiritual activities are known to be 1) the participation in and study of right doctrine, which is a companion to prayer, 2) good works, which are a form of prayer themselves, and 3) the reception of grace, which is an answer to our prayer, and is made manifest in the Holy Sacraments of the Church. These activities serve to help us grow into spiritually mature people, pleasing to God, and allow us to partake in the gift of communion with Him in His Holy Spirit.

Therefore, it would be wise for you, beloved reader, to make prayer an important part of your daily life. We have not written out the sayings of our Lord, neither those of Saint Paul, concerning prayer, since the New Testament scriptures are readily available for your own study.

May God always hear your prayers. Amen.





MAKING THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

First: join together the first three fingers (thumb, index and middle) of your right hand. Then place them on your mouth and say: Glory be, and lift them to your forehead and say: to the Father, and bring them down to your breast and say: and to the Son. Then place it on your right shoulder and say: and to the Holy, then placing it on the left shoulder say: Spirit [forever].

And this is the meaning: Glory be to the Father on high, and to the Son who descended and dwelt among us, and who gave the Spirit to priesthood, which is on the right side, which gives sanctity to the kingship (i.e. temporal authority) which is on the northern side (i.e. the left).

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BEGINNING YOUR PRAYERS

First, begin by making the Sign of the Cross (see page 31): In the name of the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit; forever. Amen.

Continue: Holy, holy, holy are You, O Almighty Lord God. The heavens and the earth are filled with Your praises, and with the nature of Your essence, and with the beauty of Your glorious splendor. Continue: Glory to You, glory to You, glory to You: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Glory be to Your glorious Trinity at all times and forever; amen. Continue: Glory be to God in the highest, Glory be to God in the highest, and on earth peace and good hope to men, at all times and forever; amen.

Then add: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name. Your Kingdom come: holy, holy, holy are Your, our Father in heaven. Heaven and earth are filled with the greatness of

Your glory. Angels and men cry unto You: holy, holy, holy are You.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name. Your Kingdom come, your will be done, as in heaven so on earth. Give us the bread for our need this day. And forgive us our debts, as we forgave our debtors. And led us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for yours is the Kingdom, and the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit.

From everlasting to everlasting, amen and amen.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name. Your Kingdom come: holy, holy, holy are Your, our Father in heaven. Heaven and earth are filled with the greatness of Your glory. Angels and men cry unto You: holy, holy, holy are You.

Continue: Our Lord and our Father who is in heaven: make me worthy to sanctify, praise, exalt and laud Your holy Name, without ceasing and distraction, in the night and in the day; amen.

Make me worthy of Your Kingdom in Your goodness, and of beholding Your countenance, and of Your love and the love of Your Son and of Your Holy Spirit; amen.

Make me worthy, O my Lord, to fulfill Your will in my soul by the might of Your Spirit, in heaven and on earth; amen.

Give us the bread of our need this day, and forgive us our debts and sins, in Your mercy. Give us the strength to love and forgive one another, according to Your commandment and Your will.


Do not let us enter into trial deprived of Your help, but deliver us from the passions, and save us from the demons in Your goodness.

EVENING PRAYER

First, begin Evening Prayer as indicated on Page 33.

Psalm 65

A prayer of thanksgiving and glorifying God for his goodness towards us.

PRAISE is befitting thee, O God, in Zion; and unto thee shall the vow be performed;

- 2 O hear my prayer; unto thee shall all flesh come.
- 3 The words of the wicked have prevailed against me; as for our transgressions, thou shalt purge them.
- 4 Blessed is the man in whom thou art pleased, he whom thou causest to approach unto thee, that he may dwell in thy

courts and be satisfied with the goodness of thy house, even of thy holy temple.

- 5 From the majesty of thy righteousness answer us, O God of our salvation, who art the confidence of all the ends of the earth, and of the peoples who are afar off,
- 6 Who settest fast the mountains by his strength, and is mighty in his power;
- 7 He stills the tempest of the seas and the roar of their waves. The peoples shall be troubled.
- 8 The inhabitants of the earth shall tremble at thy wonders, from the coming of the morning to the evening.
- 9 With glory didst thou visit the earth and water it; thou hast blessed it with peace and hast greatly enriched it with the river of God, which is full of water; thou hast prepared food when thou hast established it.
- 10 Thou hast watered the fallowed ground thereof; to bring forth fruits, thou hast sprinkled its growth with showers and blessed it.

A prayer of thanksgiving given to God on behalf of the deliverance he provides us from sin and all evil.

MAKE a joyful noise unto God, all lands.

- 2 Sing the honor of his name; sing the honor of his majesty.
- 3 Say unto God, How wonderful are thy works! Through the greatness of thy power shall thine enemies submit themselves unto thee
- 4 All the earth shall worship thee, and shall sing unto thy name; they shall glorify thy name forever.
- 5 They shall say, Come and see the works of God; for his wonders are great toward the children of men.
- 6 He turns the sea into dry land: they crossed through the river on foot; there did we rejoice in him.
- 7 He rules by his power forever; his eyes behold the nations; let not the rebellious exalt themselves.
- 8 O bless our God, you people, and make the voice of his praise to be heard,
- 9 Who holds our soul in life, and suffers not our feet to be moved.
- 10 For thou, O God, hast proved us; thou hast tried us as silver is tried.

A GENERAL PRAYER RULE THROUGHT THE DAY

Begin by making the Sign of the Cross on our body and say "In the name of..." Then kneel upon the ground and say three times, "Create in me a pure heart, O God." Then rise on your feet, and with your mind directed towards Christ our Savior, begin your prayers (as indicated on page 33), then offer The Lord's Prayer, "Our Father in Heaven..." Then, kneel again on the ground and say three times the following verses: "Have mercy upon me, O God, according to your loving-kindness, and according to the multitude of your mercies blot out my sins. Thoroughly wash me from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sins." Rise again and stand on your feet. Then begin to say the Trisagion three times, "Holy God, Holy Mighty, Holy Immortal. Have mercy upon us." Then, say The Lord's Prayer again, "Our Father in Heaven..." (see page 33). Then, worship with your face upon the ground and say seven times, "Our Lord have mercy upon us." After this, speak freely whatever you wish in your heart, while asking for the forgiveness of sins, help against temptation, and giving praise unto God the Lord of all. After all of this is concluded, end the prayer by making the sign of the Cross three times: Once on your forehead, once on your heart, and once on your entire body; saying each time you make the sign of the Cross, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, O our Lord, preserve me".

The Profession of Faith

(The Nicene Creed)

And we confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection of our bodies, and life for ever and ever. Amen.

Following the Creed the Priest washes his hands and prepares to approach the altar. The priest turns to the deacons on his right and left and says:

Priest: May God the Lord of all be with us all, in us all, in his grace and mercies forever: Amen.

Priest: Bless, O my Lord. Pray for me, my brethren.

Deacon: May Christ hear your prayers, receive your supplications, and be well pleased with your Oblation in the goodness of his compassion forever, Amen.

(The priest recites this prayer silently)

And he turns his face to the altar and offers three genuflections, while at each genuflection he draws nearer to it. And at the beginning of a genuflection he begins to supplicate in this manner, speaking softly with his lips this prayer of Mar Bar Sauma:

Glory to you, O Finder of the lost. Glory to you, O Gatherer of the dispersed. Glory to you, who bring near the far off. Glory to you, who return the erring to the knowledge of the truth. Glory to you, my Lord, for you have called me, even feeble me, in your grace, and have brought me near unto you in your compassion, and have established me as a designated member in the great body of your holy catholic Church, to offer before you this living, holy, and acceptable sacrifice,

which is the memorial of the passion, death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, - through whom you were well-pleased and reconciled to forgive the sins of all men. (*repeat*).

Deacon: Let us pray; peace be with us. Pray for the memorial of our fathers the catholicoi and bishops; and of all priests and deacons and young men and virgins; and of all who have died and departed from this world in the true faith; and of all our fathers and brethren; of all our sons and daughters; of all faithful Christ-loving kings; of all prophets and apostles; and of all martyrs and confessors here and everywhere, that God may crown them at the resurrection from the dead, and give us a good hope and portion with them, and an inheritance and life in the Kingdom of Heaven.

During his approach to the altar the priest interrupts the deacons and again calls upon them.

(Priest turns to the deacon of the right-horn)

Priest: Bless, O my Lord. My brethren, pray for me, that this Oblation may be fulfilled by my hands.

Deacon replies: May God the Lord of all strengthen you to fulfill his will. May he accept your Oblation, and be well-pleased with your sacrifice which you offer for us, for yourself, and for the four regions of the world, through the goodness of his compassion for ever. Amen.

Deacon: Let us pray; peace be with us. Pray for the memorial of our fathers the catholicoi and bishops; and of all priests and deacons and young men and virgins; and of all who have died and departed from this world in the true faith; and of all our fathers and brethren; of all our sons and daughters; of all faithful Christ-loving kings; of all prophets and apostles; and of all martyrs and confessors here and everywhere, that God may crown them at the resurrection from the dead, and give us a good hope and portion with them, and an inheritance and life in the Kingdom of Heaven.

(Priest turns to the deacons of the left-horn and interrupts them a second time and says):

Priest: Bless, O my Lord. Pray for me, my brothers and my beloved, that I may be deemed worthy to offer before our Lord Christ this living and holy sacrifice for myself and for all the community of the holy Church, through the goodness of his compassion for ever. Amen.

Deacon replies: God the Lord of all be well-pleased with your sacrifice and may he accept your Oblation, which you offer

for us, and for yourself, through the goodness of his compassion for ever. Amen.

Deacon: Let us pray; peace be with us. * Said with bent head and in a low voice

Priest (softly): We give thanks, O my Lord, for the abundant riches of your loving-kindnesses toward us, (repeat) for though we are sinners and unworthy, you have deemed us worthy to administer the Holy Mysteries of the body and blood of your Christ. We ask for help from you for the strengthening of our souls, - that with perfect love and true faith we may administer your gift to us. Repeat the beginnings of G'hantas and their ends.

After the approach to the altar has been made, the priest prays softly, until he reaches the doxology at the end of his prayer, at which time he lifts up his voice:

Please STAND

If one who is a patriarch, metropolitan, or bishop is present, the celebrant does not offer up this qanona because of the honor of the high priest who is present — but he recites it with the G'hanta and raises his voice at "for ever and ever".



Qanona (Canon)

Priest: And we will lift up to you praise, honor, confession and worship, now and always and forever and ever.

Response/ALL: Amen.

The priest has now received the peace from the holy altar, and from him it is passed throughout the congregation.

The Kiss of Peace

Priest: Peace be with you (*)

Response/ALL: And with you and with your spirit.

Deacon announces: Give the Peace one to another in the love of Christ.

Deacon: For all catholicoi, bishops, presbyters, and deacons, and every member of a religious profession who has departed from the assembly of the Church, and for the life and tranquility of the world, and for the crown of the year, that it may be blessed and fulfilled in your grace, and for every child of the Church who is worthy of the reception of this Oblation before you, and for all your servants and handmaidens who stand before you at this hour, for all of them and for all of us may this Oblation be accepted for ever. Amen.

Deacon continues with the Kiss of Peace – karozutha.

Deacon: Let us all in purity and with sighs give thanks and beseech and supplicate the Lord. Stand aright and look upon those things which are done in the fearful Mysteries being hallowed. The priest draws near to pray, that by his mediation peace may be multiplied for you. Lower your eyes, and stretch out your mind to heaven.

(While offering incense

Priest: (With the myrrh and aloes of Nicodemus your holy body was anointed on the day of your burial, and with this incense we too, your worshipers, sweeten your entombed body as with spices. Then let it be blessed by your grace, and let it be hallowed, and may it supply a mystery, and bring pardon for our debts and sins. May it be as a sweet fragrance for you, and for your Father, and for the Holy Spirit, now, always, and for ever and ever.

Continues: In the worshipful and glorious name of your glorious Trinity may this incense be blessed, which we offer to your honor and for our absolution for ever. Amen.)

Priest continues: O my Lord, in your many ineffable mercies, (repeat), make a good and acceptable memorial for all the just and righteous fathers who were well-pleasing before you through the commemoration of the body and blood of your Christ which we offer you upon your pure and holy altar, as you taught us. Bring to pass your tranquility and peace in us all the days of the world. - Yea, our Lord and our

God, bring to pass your tranquility and peace in us all the days of the world, (repeat), that all the inhabitants of the earth may know you—that you alone are God, the Father of truth, and that you sent our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son and your Beloved, and he, our Lord and our God, came and taught us in his life-giving gospel all the purity and holiness of the prophets and apostles, of the martyrs and confessors, of the bishops and teachers, of the presbyters and deacons, and of all the children of the holy catholic Church - who have been signed with the living seal of holy Baptism.

(ALL: KNEEL) We also, my Lord, (repeat 3 times) your feeble, unworthy, and miserable servants who are gathered in your name and stand before you at this hour, and have received by tradition the example which is from you, while rejoicing, glorifying, exalting, and commemorating, perform this great, fearful, holy, life-giving, and divine Mystery of the passion, death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Deacons announce: In silence and in awe stand and pray: Peace be with us.

Priest lifts up his voice and continues: ... And may there come, O my Lord, your Holy Spirit, and may he rest upon this Oblation of your servants. May he bless it and hallow it, and may it be for us, O my Lord, for the pardon of debts, the forgiveness of sins, the great hope of resurrection from the dead, and for new life in the Kingdom of Heaven with all who have been well-pleasing before you. And for all this great and marvelous dispensation towards us we will give thanks to

you and praise you without ceasing in your Church, which is saved by the precious blood of your Christ - with unclosed mouth and open face, (repeat).

Response: Amen Bless, O my Lord.

(The priest lifts up his voice and says:)

Qanona (Canon)

Priest: while lifting up glory and honor and confession and worship to your living and holy and life-giving name, now always and forever and ever.

Deacons reply: Amen.

* * * * * The Curtain closes * * * * *

The Priest and Deacons continue in preparing the Blessed Sacrament, with prayers, incense, etc.

Please SIT

ALL - the first two verses: O Christ, the peace of those above, and the great tranquility of those below, • make your tranquility and peace to dwell, O my Lord, in the four regions of the world, and especially in your holy catholic Church. Reconcile the priesthood with the kingdom, and bring wars to an end from the ends of the earth. Scatter the divided nations which desire war, that we may inhabit a quiet and tranquil dwelling-place, in all chastity and the fear of God.

the breaking and signation OF THE CONSECRATED BREAD AND WINE

After prayers and psalms the priest breaks the body and signs both it and the chalice with a broken portion. He and the people first offer prayers.

Priest: Bless, O my Lord; bless, O my Lord; bless, O my Lord. The mercifulness of your grace has brought us near, O our Lord and our God, to these glorious, holy, life-giving and divine Mysteries, though we are unworthy.

ALL, **Deacon/people**: In truth, my Lord, we are not worthy. Pardon us, O my Lord, for we are not worthy, through our frailty, because of our many sins.

Priest: Praise to your holy name, O our Lord Jesus Christ, and worship to your Lordship at all times for ever. Amen. - For [this is] the living and life-giving bread which descended from heaven and gives life to utterly all the world, for those who eat of it do not die and those who receive it are saved by it and by it are pardoned and live for ever. Amen.

Response/ALL: Amen.

And he kisses the Bukhra in the sign of the cross, though he does not bring it to his lips except in a figurative manner, and he turns it in a circle before his eyes, upward and downward, and from right to left.

Priest: Glory to you, O my Lord. Glory to you, O my Lord. Glory to you, O my Lord, on account of your ineffable gift to us for ever. Amen.

Response/ALL: Amen.

And he clasps the Bukhra with both hands and says:

We draw near, O my Lord, in the true faith of your name toward these holy Mysteries, and we break in your compassion and sign in your mercifulness the body and blood of your Beloved, our Lord Jesus Christ, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit for ever.

Response/ALL: Amen.

Priest continues: The precious blood is signed with the lifegiving body of our Lord Jesus Christ in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit for ever.

That is, from east to west toward himself, "and of the Holy Spirit" from north to south toward the paten. Thus he signs the body on the paten in the same way with the half in his hand, saying:

The holy body is signed with the absolving blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit for ever.

Response/ALL: Amen.

And he grasps both halves with both hands and holds them with one another as though not broken. And his fingers and thumbs should be bound round the halves like a circle.

Priest: These glorious, holy, life-giving, and divine Mysteries are set apart, hallowed, perfected, fulfilled, united, commingled, joined, and sealed, one with another, in the worshipful and glorious name of the glorious Trinity, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, that they may be to us, O my Lord, for the pardon of debts and the forgiveness of sins, for the great hope of the resurrection from the dead, and for new life in the kingdom of heaven, to us and to the holy Church of Christ our Lord, here and everywhere, now, always, and for ever and ever.



Deacon: See that it is I.

I am the bread which came down from on high, said our Savior in a mystery to his Disciples. Whoever in love draws near and receives me, lives in me forever and inherits the Kingdom.

ALL: Bless the Lord, you his angels.

The cherubim and seraphim and archangels in fear and trembling stand before the altar; and they look at the priest breaking and dividing the Body of Christ for the pardon of debts.

Deacon: The Lord holds him in His hands.

Fire in the burning coal kissed Isaiah: his lips did not burn and his transgressions were absolved. Mortals partake of fire in bread: it preserves their bodies, and their transgressions are burnt.

ALL: The one whose hands are pure and who is approved in his heart. When the priest enters into the Holy of Holies, in purity he lifts up his hands unto Heaven, and invites the Holy Spirit, who descends from the Highest, sanctifying the Body and Blood of Christ.

Deacon: Open to me the gates of righteousness:

O Compassionate One, whose door is open to the penitent, and who calls sinners to draw near to him,

(Here the curtain opens)

ALL:

open to us, O my Lord, the door of mercies, that we may enter through it; and sing glory to you by night and by day.

When the breaking and signing are complete and the curtain is withdrawn, the priest proclaims.

Qanona (Canon)

Priest: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God the Father, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of us, now, always, and for ever and ever.

Response ALL: Amen.

The priest now breaks the Host into portions to be administered to the congregation.

Deacon continues: Let us all in awe and reverence approach the Mystery of the precious Body and Blood of our Savior.

- * With a pure heart and with true faith, let us recall his passion and consider his resurrection.
- * For on our behalf the Only-Begotten of God took from men a mortal body, and a rational, sentient, and immortal soul.
- * And by his life-giving laws and by his holy commandments brought us from error to the knowledge of the truth.
- * And after all his dispensation for us, he, the first-fruits of our nature, was tested by the cross; rose from the dead, and ascended to heaven.

- * And he commited to us his holy Mysteries, that by them we might recall all his grace towards us. Let us, then, with overflowing love, and with a lowly will receive the gift of eternal life.
- * With pure prayer and manifold sorrow, let us partake in the Mysteries of the Church in hope of repentance.
- * Turning from our offences, and sorrowing for our sins, and asking mercy and forgiveness from God, the Lord of all.

Deacon, continues: We overlook the offences of our fellow-servants.

Response/ALL: Lord, pardon the sins and offences of your servants.

Deacon: We purify our consciences from division and strife. **Response/ALL:** Lord, pardon the sins and offences of your servants.

Deacon: Our souls being cleared of wrath and enmity. **Response/ALL:** Lord, pardon the sins and offences of your servants.

Deacon: Let us take the sacrament and be sanctified by the Holy Spirit.

Response/ALL: Lord, pardon the sins and offences of your servants.

Deacon: In unity and with a mingling of our minds let us receive in mutual agreement the communion of the Mysteries

Response/ALL: Lord, pardon the sins and offences of your servants.

Deacon: That they may be to us, O my Lord, for the resurrection of our bodies and for the salvation of our souls **Response/ALL:** And for eternal and unending life.

Deacon: Let us pray: Peace be with us.

The priest recites softly, in his heart:

Pardon in your compassion, O my Lord, the sins and offenses of your servants, and hallow our lips in your loving-kindness, that they may yield the fruits of glory to your exalted Godhead with all your saints in your Kingdom.

Lifting up his voice and saying:

And make us worthy, our Lord and our God, to stand before you continually without spot, with a pure heart and with confidence; and with the liberty which is from you, through the mercies given to us, that we may all equally cry out and in this manner say:

ALL: (priest, deacons, people)

Our Father in Heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done, as in Heaven, so on earth. Give us the bread of our need this day, and forgive us our offences, as we have also forgiven those who have offended us. And bring us

not to trial, but deliver us from the Evil One. For thine is the Kingdom and the power and the glory for ever: Amen.

Priest: Yea our Lord and our God, we beseech you and supplicate the mercifulness of your grace, do not, my Lord, do not, my Lord, lead us to the test, but save and deliver us from the Evil One and his hosts, for yours is the Kingdom, power, might, strength, and dominion, in Heaven and on earth, now, always, (and he signs over himself and lifts up his voice), and for ever and ever.

ALL: Amen.

Following the Lord's Prayer the priest turns to the congregation and declares the sacrament ready for those eligible to receive it. After the "Peace" he lifts up and extols the Holy Trinity along with the people.

Priest: Peace be with you. (*)

Response ALL: And with you and with your spirit.

Priest continues: The Holy Thing is perfectly meet for the holy.

Response ALL: One Holy Father, one Holy Son, one Holy Spirit. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.

A sermon may be delivered at this point.

Absolution

Priest: O our good and merciful God (repeat), whose grace and compassion are poured out upon all, pour out, my Lord, your compassionate kindness upon these, your servants. Change them through the hope of renewal again to a changed life. Renew within them your Holy Spirit, with which they were sealed unto the day of salvation. Purify them in your compassion from all defilement of flesh and spirit. Strengthen the hope of their faith through the assistance of your grace. Guide the steps of their ways in the pathways of righteousness, and grant them delight with the saints in your Kingdom through the truth of the hope of their faith in the adoption of sons, and gladness in the absolving Mysteries. Strengthen them through the assistance of your mercies, that they may keep your commands and fulfill your will, and confess, worship, and praise your holy name, O Lord of all, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit for ever. Amen. (*)

Response ALL: Amen.

Curtain closes, priest and deacons prepare to communicate

The Faithful

Deacon: Give praise to the living God.

Response ALL: Praise be to him in his Church, and may his mercies and compassion be upon us at all times and seasons.

And the people sing the "Anthem of the Bema" for the day (see the bulletin).

At the conclusion of the Anthem the priest and deacons go to the nave with the sacrament to commune the faithful.

* * * * * Curtain opens * * * * *

Please **STAND**

Deacon: Bless, O my Lord.

The priest blesses the people in the nave, and he says in an audible voice: The gift of grace of our Life-giver, our Lord Jesus Christ, be perfected in all of us through his mercies.

Response ALL: For ever and ever. Amen.

Then the people say the verses of the anthem. - Of the Mysteries: My brothers, receive the body of the Son, says the Church, and drink his cup in faith in the Kingdom.

And when the priest gives the body he says: The body of our Lord to the pious believer __(name)__ for the pardon of debts.

Response: Amen

And the deacon says concerning the chalice: The precious blood for the pardon of debts, a spiritual feast unto eternal life, to the pious believer

Response: Amen



Communion hymns are sung at this point by the CHOIR/ALL

After all have communed, the clergy return to the altar and a deacon proclaims:

Deacon: Let us all, therefore, who through the gift of the grace of the Holy Spirit have drawn near and have been deemed worthy and have participated in the reception of these Holy Mysteries, glorious, holy, life-giving and divine, together confess and glorify God their giver.

Response: Glory to him for his unspeakable gift.

Deacon: Let us pray: Peace be with us.

Priest: For Sundays and Feasts: It is meet, O my Lord, every day (repeat), and right at all times, and worthy at every hour, to confess, worship, and glorify the fearful name of your greatness, for you, O my Lord, through your grace, have made worthy the weak nature of mortal men to hallow your name with spiritual beings, to participate in the Mysteries of your gift, to take delight in the sweetness of your words, and to lift up voices of glory and thanksgiving to your exalted Godhead at every hour, O Lord of all, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit for ever.

Priest: He who blesses us with all spiritual blessings in Heaven through Jesus Christ our Lord, and summons us to his Kingdom, and calls us and brings us near to his desirable blessings which do not pass away, nor cease, nor depart—as he advised and promised in his life-giving Gospel, saying to the blessed company of his disciples, Amen, amen I say to you, whoever eats my body and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him, and I will raise him up at the last day, and he does not come to judgment but passes from death to eternal life—may the same bless our company and guard our standing. May he beautify our people who came and took delight in the power of his glorious, holy, life-giving, and divine Mysteries. By the living sign of the cross (*) of the Lord may you be sealed and preserved from all harm, hidden and open, now, always, and for ever and ever.

Response ALL: Amen.



O my Lord! May the prophets, apostles, martyrs and confessors pray to You on my behalf.

O my Lord! May all including those who have repented and those who are sinless pray to You on my behalf.

O my Lord! May the holy women in the convents and those who dwell in the forest pray to You on my behalf.

O my Lord! May the wise ones dwelling in caves and those hermits living in solitude in their mud-huts pray to You on my behalf.

O my Lord! May all those upon whom You have mercy pray on my behalf, that You may forgive my offences, wash away my sins and save me from the affliction of evil spirits, from the wickedness of evil men, from all treacherous adversaries, from unholy desires and impure thoughts, from nightmares, from wicked and vile talk, from crooked paths and sinful quarrels and conflicts, and from everything that keeps me distant from Your love.

By the prayers of all those whom You answered when they called You, and whom You saved when they took refuge in You and by nothing else. Amen.

Peh. O Lord! Deliver me from evil men and from the treacherous Enemy and save me from the deceitful tongue and all harmful conversations, from dangerous restraints and from unbearable events and experiences. Keep me from worldly trials and temptations, from human cunning, from the ignorance and blindness of the conscience, from the fickleness and frailty of thoughts and from all harmful punishments beyond my infirmities.

O my Lord! Let not my punishment come from wicked men and spiteful demons, but, O my Lord, let it come from Your hands, for You are abundantly merciful.

O my Lord! Do not reprimand me by Your righteousness, and do not punish me by Your wrath. Rather, by Your grace have mercy upon me, and answer me in Your compassion, and help me.

O my good Lord, who takes care of all things in Your goodness, forgive my sins and my transgressions which I have committed. Wipe them away for I am a weak-minded person who may go astray. By the prayers of all those who have been well-pleasing to Your, those who now please you, and those who were and also those who now are reconciled to You, and by nothing else. Amen.

Lamadh. O God! I have not spurned Your grace, nor have I denied the gifts You have given me, nor forgotten Your care and concern for me. All the same, I do confess that I do not deserve Your mercy and compassion for me. I confess that Your grace for me is certainly abundant. I confess that You have honored me although I am not worthy of it. I confess my sins as that harlot did confess her sins; for me even as You forgave her. I confess my sins as that Canaanite woman did confess her sins. Forgive and protect me as You forgave and protected her. I also confess that throughout my life I have provoked You by my thoughts, my words and my deeds. On this day deliver me from wicked people and accursed adversaries, and from impious neighbors, from the cruel Satan, from disastrous snares, dangerous and unexpected occurrences, treacherous talk, harmful words and from the harmful effects of sin, from wrongs committed unwittingly, from the grumbling Adversary and rom enemies seeking revenge, from evil men and evil thoughts, and from filthy deeds and unholy thoughts.

Give me a wholesome body and a clean tongue and gentle thoughts.

Give me everything that sustains my life, and does good to me and pleases Your majesty.

Give the food I need and the wealth that brings honor to me. Give me bodily healthy and spiritual strength. Make me worthy of hating sin, keeping myself away from injustice, fleeing from the sin of extortion, condemning evil, keeping myself away from vice, obeying my parents, of remaining loyal and submissive to my prelates, and comforting my friends and respecting my relatives.

May Your holy name be glorified by all the work I do, by the prayers of the prophets and apostles, the martyrs and the confessors, and by nothing else. Amen.

Lamadh. O my Lord! I have stretched my hands forth towards You, and my eyes look to Your mercy. I cry out to You. I take refuge in You. I beg for Your blessings. I implore Your mercy. Do not forget. Do not forsake me. Do not reject me. Do not abandon me. Do not make me the target of the ridicule of my enemies; do not make me the target of the ridicule my friends.

Let not the devil be happy over my sins. Let not the jealous one boast over my faults and failures.

On Prayer

Purity of heart constitutes prayer more than do all the prayers that are uttered out aloud, and silence united to a mind that is sincere is better than the loud voice of someone crying out.

My beloved: give me now your heart and your thought, and hear about the power of pure prayer; see how our righteous forefathers excelled in their prayer before God, and how it served them as a pure offering. For it was through prayer that offerings were accepted, and it was prayer again that averted the Flood from Noah; prayer has healed barrenness, prayer has overthrown armies, prayer has revealed mysteries, prayers has divided the sea, prayer made a passage through the Jordan, it held back the sun, it made the moon stand still, it destroyed the unclean, it

caused fire to descend. Prayer closed up the heavens, prayer raised up from the pit, rescued from the fire and saved from the sea. The power of prayer, like the power of pure fasting, is very great...

...The moment you start praying, raise your heart upwards, and lower your eyes downwards; enter inside your inner person and pray in secrete to your Father who is in heaven [Matthew 6:6]. All this have I written to you on the subject of prayer-how it is heard when it is pure, and not heard when it is not pure—because there are amongst us people who multiply prayers and make long supplications, doubling themselves up and spreading out their hands, while the true task of prayer is far from them; for they pray the prayer our Savior taught: "Forgive us our debts, as we too will forgive our debtors" [Matthew 6:12]—but fail to keep their part. You who pray should remember that you are making an offering before God: let not Gabriel who presents the prayers be ashamed by an offering that has a blemish. When you pray to be forgiven, and acknowledge that you yourself forgive, consider first in your mind whether you really do forgive, and only then acknowledge 'I forgive.' You must not act deceitfully with God and say 'I forgive' when you do not really forgive; for God is not like you, a mortal, whom you can deceive. "When one man sins against another, he can beseech the Lord, but when someone has wronged God, who then can he beseech?" [cf. Numbers 23:19]. Do not bring condemnation upon yourself through your prayer!

On True Prayer

A true prayer consists in good works, in love of God, and diligence in the things that please Him. He who is intent on these things and whose mind contemplates them, prays without hindrance always, and at all times, whenever he does the things that please (God). To such a one invocations of prayers are always needful, because it is fitting for him who strives after good things to ask God to help him in these same things after which he is striving, in order that all his life might be in accordance with God's will. And it is known that such a one will have his prayers answered, because it is impossible that he who is diligent in the divine commandments and acts according to them and does not break them, should not assuredly receive help from Him who enacted them; it is likewise clear beforehand that he who leads a life that is not in harmony with them, will not receive any help from prayer, since he is caring for things which do not please God and asking for such things as he himself chose to do all his life.

On the Reading of the Psalms

Any part of the Scriptures you like to choose is inspired by God. The Holy Spirit composed the Scriptures so that in them, as in a pharmacy open to all souls, we might each of us be able to find the medicine suited to our own particular illness.

Thus, the teaching of the Prophets is one thing, and that of the Historical Books is another. And, again, the Law has one meaning, and the advice we read in the Book of Proverbs has a different one.

But the Book of Psalms contains everything useful that the others have. It predicts the future, it recalls the past, it gives directions for living, it suggests the right behavior to adopt. It is, in short, a jewel-case in which have been collected all the valid teachings in such a way that individuals find remedies just right for their cases. It heals the old wounds of the soul and gives relief to recent ones. It cures the illnesses and preserves the health of the soul.

Every Psalm brings peace, soothes the internal conflicts, calms the rough waves of evil thoughts, dissolves anger, corrects and moderates profligacy.

Every Psalm preserves friendship and reconciles those who are separated. Who could actually regard as an enemy the person beside whom they have raised a song to the one God?

Every Psalm anticipates the anguish of the night and gives rest after the efforts of the day. It is safety for

babes, beauty for the young, comfort for the aged, adornment for women. Every Psalm is the voice of the Church!

When You Pray

When you pray, it is as if you were entering into a palace—not a palace on earth, but far more awesome, a palace in heaven. When you enter there, you do so with complete attentiveness and fitting respect. For in the houses of kings all turmoil is set aside, and silence reigns. Yet here you are being joined by choirs of angels. You are in communion with archangels and singing with seraphim, who sing with great awe their spiritual hymns and sacred songs to God, the Lord of all.

So when you are praying, mingle with these voices, patterning yourself according to their mystical order. It is not to human beings that you are praying but to God, who is present everywhere, who hears even before you speak and who knows already the secrets of the heart. If you pray to this One, you shall receive a great reward, "For your Father who sees in secret shall reward you openly" [Matthew 6:6]. He did not

merely say he would 'give it' to you but 'reward' you, as if he himself had made a pledge to you and so honored you with a great honor. Because God himself is hidden, your prayer should be hidden.

On Confidence in Prayer

Sit in the presence of the Lord every moment of your life, as you think of Him and recollect Him in your heart. Otherwise, when you only see him after a period of time, you will lack freedom of converse with Him, out of shame; for great freedom of converse is born out of constant association with Him.

Constant association with fellow-beings involves the body, whereas when it is with God, it involves the soul's meditation and the offering of prayers. As a result of its great intensity, this meditation is sometimes mingled with wonder: "The heart of those who seek the Lord shall rejoice" [Psalm 105:3].

Seek the Lord, O sinners, and be strengthened in your thoughts with hope. Seek His face through repentance at all times—and you shall be sanctified by the holiness of His face. You shall be purged clean of your wickedness. Run to the Lord, all who are wicked; He forgives wickedness and removes sins.

On Unceasing Prayer

Make it your care to pray without ceasing [cf. I Thessalonians 5:17], for prayer is light to the soul, and it acts as a guard to the body. Pray not just when you are standing in prayer, but also when you are moving around or doing something, and even when you are asleep, and when you are eating. When your mouth is occupied with nourishment, let your heart be occupied with prayer. While your right hand is looking after your body's needs at table, let you mind be given to praise and thanksgiving to Him who provides for your needs. In this way your food will be blessed and made holy in your body, without your being concerned about this.

Be alert so that you are not overcome by any passions, and error lead you astray. Instead, while others are having a good time, giving pleasure to their bodies at meal time, you should be praying, giving pleasure to your soul.

The greater the variety of delicacies set before you, do you the more give praises in your soul to Christ the Giver of all good things you have.

And if you are going to be assiduous in the activity of prayer, my beloved, do not have many things to attract you; do not omit to say the Liturgy hours on any pretext, lest you find the words "Cast the useless servant into outer darkness' [Matthew 25:30] apply to you. Do not get entangled in a large number of activities; they are rust to your soul and disease to your body.

On Struggle in Prayer

So now, let us leave behind everything visible because it is transitory, and let us turn away from external sins. When we cut off all of our visible sins we shall rise up in the struggle against the Sin that dwells in us internally, because they are the evil thoughts that Sin devises in the heart. With power may we pursue the struggle that is set

before us and let us do battle with prayer just as our Lord did before us. He showed us that with a mighty groan and many tears Jesus offered a petition to Him who delivered him from death [Hebrews 5:7-9]. He was delivered and made perfect.

But until we are afflicted in prayer like him and shed tears as he shed and powerfully implore as he implored, we will not be rescued from the sin that dwells in the heart, or from the evil thoughts that we inwardly think. So it is fitting for the men who are in Christ to raise their hands in every region and in every place without anger and without evil thoughts [I Timothy 2:8], having shed tears in their love for our Lord and in their yearning for him. At that time let us go see him face to face, as it is written, "Blessed are those who are pure in their heart, for they shall see God" [Matthew 5:8]. In this world, as Paul said, we see our Lord with the eyes of our hearts as in a mirror; but in that [other] world, [we will see him] face to face [I Corinthians 13:12].

When we pray to the Lord with our heart, let us greatly rejoice, [both] with our lips [and] inwardly. We inwardly rejoice when our heart does not condemn us with sin and when we have no need to be ashamed before our Lord because we have kept all of his commandments. So we rejoice as David said, "My heart shall rejoice in you, O Lord, and in those who fear your name. I will give you thanks, my Lord and my God, with all of my heart, and I will glorify your name forever, because your grace has increased toward me and you have delivered my soul from the lower world of Sheol" [Psalm 86:11-

13]. You see how God redeemed our fathers from the hand of Sheol and how their heart rejoiced in the Lord and in those who fear his name. Moreover, as Mary said "My soul magnifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, who has given heed to the lowliness of his handmaiden" [Luke 1:46]. You see how she rejoiced in her inner spirit and was glad in her mind because she had found grace and mercy before the Lord.

On Prayer

Be eager in prayer, and vigilant, without wearying; and remove from yourself drowsiness and sleep. You should be watchful both by night and by day; do not be disheartened.

I will show you the different occasions for prayer. At the time when you are in trouble, offer up petition; and when you are well supplied with the good things of God, give thanks to the Giver; and when your mind rejoices, offer up praise. Let all these prayers be made with discernment.

I am convinced, my beloved, that everything that people ask in diligence and faith, God will grant them. But when someone offers up prayer in mockery or contempt or doubt, he does not receive his request, seeing that he is not firm in heart or believing that he will receive an answer. One needs to offer up prayer, being purified of all doubt and blemish, and he offers up his offering in purity, so that it might be received. He will also take care lest there be found in it anything which will result in it being rejected.

Out of all offerings, pure prayer is the most excellent. Therefore be eager in prayer, my son, and labor in it. At the beginning of all of your prayers use the prayer which our Lord taught.

On Prayer Which Befits God's Honor

Do not be foolish in the requests you make to God, otherwise you will insult God through your ignorance. Act wisely in prayer, so that you may become worthy of glorious things. Ask for things that are honorable from him who will not hold back, so that you may receive honor from him as a result of the wise choice your free will has made. Solomon asked for wisdom—and along with it he also received the earthly kingdom, for he knew how to ask wisely of the heavenly King, that is, for things that are important.

Elisha asked for twice the gift of the Spirit that his master [Elijah] had, and his request was not withheld from him.

On the other hand, a king's honor is diminished by the person who requests contemptible things from him. Israel asked for despicable things—and received in return God's anger. For, failing to wonder at God's actions and the awesome character of his works, they asked for things that the belly desires. Then, "...while their food was still in their mouths, God's anger rose up against them" [Psalm 78:30-31].

Make your request to God in accordance with is glorious nature, then he will hold you in greater honor and will rejoice at you.

When someone asks a human king for a load of manure, not only will he be despised as a result of his despicable request—seeing that he has accused himself by means of his own ignorance—but he has also offered an insult to the king by means of his stupid request. Exactly the same applies when someone asks God for the things of the body in prayer.

If God is slow in answering your request, and you ask but do not promptly receive anything, do not be upset, for you are not wiser than God. When you remain as you were before, without anything happening, it is either because your behavior is not worthy of your request, or because the paths in which your heart was travelling were far removed from the aim of your prayer, or because your interior condition is far too childish, when compared with the magnitude of things for which you have asked.

It is not appropriate that the things of great magnitude should fall easily into our hands; otherwise God's gift will be held in contempt as a result of the ease with which it is to be found. Anything that is easily found is also easily lost, whereas what is found after much labor will be guarded with vigilance.

Thirst for Jesus, so that he may inebriate you with his love. Blind your eyes to all that is held in honor in the world, so that you may be held worthy to have the peace which comes from God reign in your heart.

Fast from the allurements that make the eyes glitter, in order that you may become worthy of spiritual joy. If your way of life is unworthy of God, then do not ask him for glorious things, otherwise you will appear as someone who tempts God. Prayer accords strictly with behavior.

On Prayer as Conversation with God

He who cares, therefore, for perfection and is anxious to do the things that are pleasing to God, will pay more attention to prayer than any other thing, and he who does not care for any virtue and is not anxious to do the things that are pleasing to God, it is clear that he will show also no interest in prayer.

As we are pleased at all times to meet, and to deal and converse with, a person whom we love most, and as we do not care to meet or to speak to people whom we do not love, so those who possess God in their mind and are very anxious to do the things that please Him are wont to make use of frequent prayers, because they believe that they work and converse with Him when they pray. He, therefore, who despises Divine things and cares for other things is not anxious to pray. This is the reason why the blessed Paul orders us to pray always so that by the frequency of prayer we should implant in us the love of God and the zeal for the things that please Him.

This is the reason why our Lord also, who was man by sight and by nature, and who put in practice this mode of life and good works, showed great zeal for prayer; and because He was busy in day-time with teaching the things that were necessary, He devoted the hours of His night to the work of prayer. He used to go to lonely places in order to teach that it is necessary for the one who prays to be free from every care, so that he might extend the sight of his soul towards God and contemplate Him, and not be drawn to any other thing. He chose His times and places so that He might attract us and save us from all the disquietude by which the soul is disturbed and agitated, and sometimes involuntarily distracted from the subject it has in mind.

Because He used to do these things in this way, as the blessed Luke said, His disciples came and asked Him how it was fitting to pray, since John had also taught his disciples; and He taught perfection conveniently in the short words of prayer, which He uttered, saying: "After this manner, therefore, pray you: Our Father who is in heaven, hallowed be Your name, Your kingdom come, Your will be done as in heaven so in earth. Give us to-day our necessary bread, and forgive us our debts and our sins as we have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil, for Yours is the Kingdom, and the power, and the glory now, always, and forever and ever. Amen."

He made use of these short words as if to say that prayer does not consist so much in words as in good works, love and zeal for duty. Indeed, anyone who is inclined to good works, all his life must needs be in prayer, which is seen in his choice of these good works. Prayer is by necessity connected with good works, because a thing that is not good to be looked for is not good to be prayed for. More wicked than death by stoning is death which would come to us if we asked God to grant us things which contradict His commandments. He who offers such prayers incites God to wrath rather than to reconciliation and mercy.
